Your written work and homework in this course should grow from thoughts that have emerged from this course, thoughts that are new to you—not thoughts that you have studied in another course or ones that you have already explored. Next, *you* should be the one who develops these thoughts, not ChatGPT, not a friend, not another author—not anyone else. Large Language Models, like ChatGPT, are intoxicating. But they steal ideas from other people, and they steal important learning opportunities from you. Your papers are not going to contain original philosophical thoughts, if they are written by ChatGPT. They're going to be summaries of what's already out there on the web. You're at Kenyon to become an uploader, not a downloader.
